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present a very encouraging report indeed. They greatly need enlarged facilities. They can not begin to accommodate the people who wish to enter the institution. Many of them are rich people who are willing to pay from \$15 to \$40 per week. I believe there are five or six in the large hotel taking treatment, who came to the Sanitarium, but who could not be received as boarders. Their rooms are all full. This institution is certainly out of the woods, so far as its management is concerned. Of course they have a heavy debt, but they are beginning to reduce it quite rapidly. During the last year they have reduced their liabilities by Kr. 31,000. Their net gain in the management of the business was Kr. 17,525. The value of the business transacted the first year was Kr. 816,382. Last year, which was the fourth year of its existence, the business turned over was Kr. 991,891. There has been a steady and real growth each year. Something should be done to assist them to get better and larger facilities so that they can work their entire plant and form to better advantage.

Frederickshaven High school, is now being operated as a branch of the Skodsborg Sanitarium, is a great perplexity. Just now there is a committee of five working on this to see what can be done with it. Our brethren here are certainly struggling with tremendous difficulties; and I sincerely hope that we can do something of a practical nature to help them out.

The last thing before leaving London, I had quite a talk with Dr. Waggoner about connecting with Emmanuel Missionary College. He was then feeling quite clear about the proposal, and was anxious to hear from you and brother Sutherland in reply to what I had written. We both agreed that if you brethren responded favorably that would practically decide the matter. We must reach a decision soon so that he can begin to make preparations, and so that we can make a full announcement to our brethren in America at an early date. We must make a grand effort to have our school filled with the flower of the denomination. We may not be able to keep him more than a year, and during that time we should so fill a noble band of men and women that they can aid us in working the reformation that must be made.

I directed Brother Palmer, who remains in London for a time, to open my mail from you and Emmanuel Missionary College, and give Dr. Waggoner what information may come. We hope to hear from you soon. Brother Palmer will not come to Scandinavia. He will stay by our brethren in Great Britain until the book work is placed on a solid and satisfactory basis. He may meet me in Switzerland and he may not leave England before the council at Friedensau, which opens about the 15th of July. We want to get things well settled in Great Britain if we do not do more in any other country.

But I am very weary having been up until about midnight last night. Tomorrow morning I will be out early for Skodsborg, so I will not write more tonight.
