Dear Frother Haskelli-

since you left us, but you may be able to guess the reason. I hoped to see you again on our return from Wellington but found that your boat came in early and that you came very near being left behind. We often spoke of your during the time of your voyage and wondered how your were getting on, and we could tell when it was time for you to reach Melbourne and then thought of you as going to Adelaide to attend the camp-meeting. We shall be glad to hear from you and to learn of your experiences since we last saw you.

You knew of the plans for the meetings in Cape Town and I have sent you outlines of some of the addresses, so that you know about the linewillowed in the meetings. Taking it altogether we thought we had a good attendance throughout. At some of the meetings there were 500 or 700 and on some of the week nights there would not be more than 200, but the interest was good throughout and many of the same persons attended constantly. About 8000 of each of the outlines were distributed by the workers and they found Amny who were interested from reading who could not attend the meetings. They were beginning to appoint bible readings with different ones at the time I left and were intending to follow up the interest with meetings into the Roeland Street hall and by house to house work, bro. Edmed, Bro. Rick ardson and wife, and Sister Commin were to devote their time to this work while a good number of the young people were to canvass in Cape Town and the suburbs under the direction of Sister Hurd. I small wait with interest to hear of the results of this work and shall hope that, if it is well followed up, there may be a good number who will accept the truth. Mr. Barrows, wom you will remember, attended the meetings quite regularly and wasdeeply interested. At his invitation I called on him and we had a very satisfactory talk together. I believe he will obey soon, Many of our own people seemed to be helped by the meetings in town, in some ways more than by the work at Claremont. As we presented the evidences of the near coming of the Lord it seemed to take a strong hold upon them and the Wessels brothers talked quite freely about it. I hope theresults will be permanent with them.

Everything in the conference passed off quietly and rather curiously.

Eld. Robinson opened the way fro them to have a change in administration and after due consultation it was decided to send a cable to America to ask for Eld. Porter to come. This was done but the brethren there did not see their way clear to have him come and so it was unanimously decided to elect Eld. Robinson again with the distinct understanding, openly talked in the con ference that the General Conference would be likely to suggest a change at its next session. The good blessing of the Lord which we had received in the study of the Bible made all these things much easier. I left a the brethren of good courage and vey hopeful for the future of the work. The conference did not grant any papers to BrN. P. J. D. Wessels or Scholtz and they felt rather bad about it at the first, but we had a mestinged together where the whole matter was plainly talked over and I think they felt better after hhat.

You will be interested to know that Prof. Elffers is to leave the school at the close of the present year and will hereafter devote one half of his time to the work, mainly in translating at the present. I m have been asked to send them a principal to conduct the school as far as possible on the lines which I set forth in my talks before you left. I believe this will be agood thing for the school and for the work in general and for Frof. Elffers as well. He accepted the sugrestion in a good spirit and will enter heartily into the duties laid before him. The confiderence voted to donate the translation of Great Controversy Vol. + to the General Conference with the request that it be published at once, and he will do that translating first.

Ero. Thompson and wife are with as on their way back to America. Under all the circumstances this seemed to be the best thing for them took, do-Her health would not permit them to go further north into Natal or the TransvasI and it aid not seem to me to be best for them to remain at the Cape any longer. They pay their own expenses in returning, Erban Robinson is also with us, going to Fattle Creek to prepare for medical missionary work. This gives us a very pleasant company. Since the first day out the weather has been quite favorable and we are having a very comfortable sime, We ought to reach London two weeks from tomorrow.
